MUSIC NOTES In the late 1920's, Louis Vierne (1870-1937), the acclaimed organist of Notre-Dame de Paris, teacher of improvisation, and arguably the most well-known organist of the day, undertook several 78 rpm disk recordings of the Notre-Dame organ, including three improvisations. Due to the limited amount of music that could be recorded on a disk side, each improvisation was under four minutes. In 1953, Vierne's former student, Maurice Duruflé (1902-1986), transcribed the improvisations for publication. Though not displaying the depth and drama of Vierne's formally composed works, they do provide a glimpse into his skill as an improviser. The Vierne "Méditation," with long melodic arcs woven throughout, is paired with a composed "Méditation" by Duruflé from 1964. Duruflé won \$3,000 (in 2021 dollars) at an improvisation competition in 1929. It is not a great leap to imagine that his "Méditation" began as an improvisation which was later written down. • Well-known to the First Church community is the hymn "God of Grace and God of Glory." The text, by former First Church associate minister, Harry Emerson Fosdick (1878-1969), was written in the summer of 1930, and sung at the opening of The Riverside Church, where Fosdick was then pastor. In 1957, Paul Langston (1928-2013), long-time dean of the Stetson University School of Music, composed a choral setting, using three of Fosdick's original five stanza text.

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
