EVENING PRAYER AND BLESSING

ABOUT THE SERVICE

Much has been written on the monumental and beloved oratorio, *Messiah*. Thus, I offer only a few interesting details in the following sentences. George Frideric Handel's (1685-1759) *Messiah* was composed in a little over three weeks during August and September 1741. Musicologist Clifford Bartlett writes, "Such speed was not unusual....but, however hasty the composition, the wealth of ideas, the depth of inspiration, and the sheer variety of inspiration continue to astonish." The texts, drawn from the Old and New Testaments, and the Anglican Church *Book of Common Prayer*, were prepared by Handel's friend, the librettist Charles Jennens (1700-1773). For all the praise we esteem on the work – words and music – Jennens was less than enthusiastic: "[Handel] has made a very fine entertainment of it, though not so good as he might and ought to have done, I have with great difficulty made him correct some of the grossest faults in the composition." The first performances took place in Dublin on April 13 and June 2, 1742, then in London the following year on March 23. A summation of Messiah might be found in the words Jennens included in the preface:

Majora canamus. (Let us sing of great things.) -Virgil, Eclogue IV

And without controversy, great is the mystery of Godliness: God was manifested in the flesh, justified by the spirit, seen of angels, preached among the gentiles, believed on in the world, received up in glory. In whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge.

Messiah was first presented at First Church in November 1916, in celebration of the congregation's 200th anniversary. We do not have details to indicate if the presentation was of the entire oratorio, however, it is likely that it was with organ accompaniment, with the choir singing from the rear gallery of the church where the organ was then located. The chancel and choir area you see at the front of the Church were added in 1918. Numerous presentations of portions of the work have occurred since at First Church. Orchestral accompaniment began in 1988. - Michael Shake
